Ha'aretz (Anna)

Ha'aretz is Israel's leading left-wing newspaper, and their English version (which differs from the Hebrew language version) is the main way that I stay up to date with developments in Israel. The website provides a mixture of news and analysis, and also has an interesting range of general-interest stories on Judaism and Israel.

A subscription to Ha'aretz costs \$12 a month, which gives you access to all content and their app. There are some stories you can access without a subscription, but not many. I think it's great value considering the quality of the content, and also believe it's important to support left-wing journalism in Israel - Ha'aretz is a thorn in the side of the right and a strong voice for Israeli democracy.

+972 Magazine

+972 is a web-based magazine owned and run by a collection of journalists, bloggers and photographers committed to human rights and freedom of information, and opposed to the Occupation. They are the English language wing of a Hebrew-language site called "Local call" (+972 is the area code for both Israel and Palestine). NIF is a proud funder of +972 Magazine and you can support them through us!

I find +972 to be a great place to dip into a couple of times a week for interesting and sometimes challenging perspectives on Israel and Palestine. They have some great Israeli and Palestinian writers from a range of left-wing perspectives, with Amjad Iraqi and Dahlia Scheindlin being two of my personal favourites.

News Nosh emails (Anna)

These daily emails are produced by Americans for Peace Now, the American branch of one of Israel's most established peace movements. The emails provide a run-down of news stories in Israel, with links to fuller stories. You can see a sample email here - they are long! The emails usually start with a quote, and then list the top stories in Israel's papers that day from across

the political spectrum, so you can get a feel for what the Israeli media are focusing on. There's then a brief news summary followed by "quick hits" - 2 or 3 line summaries of many of the stories, and then links to further analysis.

The length of the emails can make them feel overwhelming, but they are a good resource. Alternatively you could follow News Nosh on Facebook, where their posts highlight a couple of the main issues of the day and link to the text of the email updates.
